We have thousands of plants lined up for the sale on Saturday, September 22, 2018 from 10 am to 2 pm. Some plants will be available in quantity, some may be single items only and others may be surprises from member donations (some arriving only the day before).

This list represents only those items for which we feel there will be sufficient quantities to reliably advertise them as being there. Still, for best selection, we recommend that you get there when the sale starts. The sale area will be divided into areas like Trees/Shrubs, Sun Perennials, Shade Perennials. We will have 150 native azaleas and they will have their own section until they sell out (usually by noon).

Remember, this is only a partial list. We encourage you to come see what unique and special items didn't make the list!

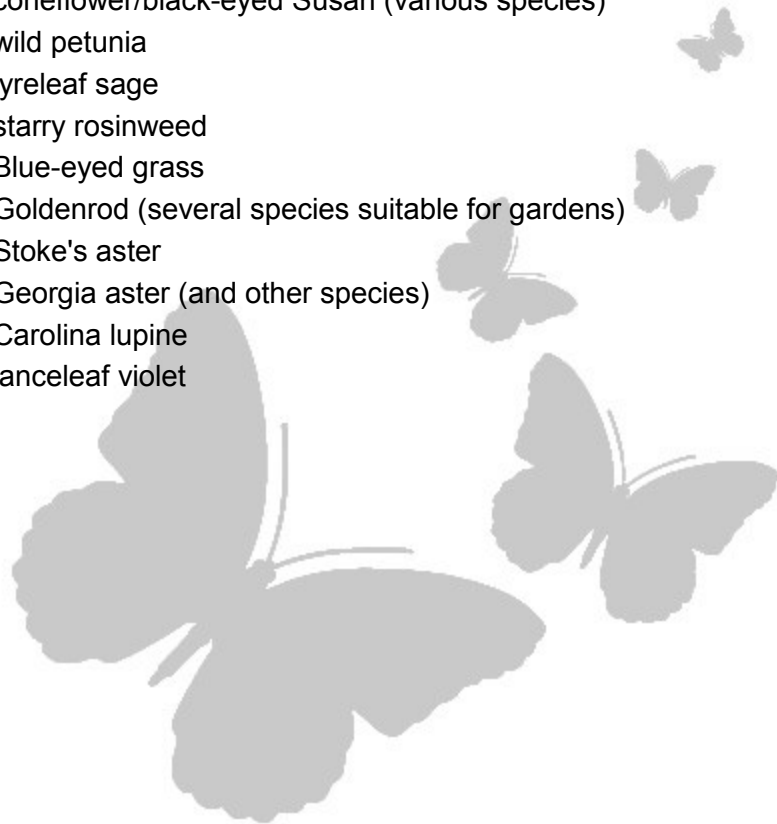

Tip: Most shade plants can handle up to 4 hours of morning sun (before noon). For hot afternoon sun, choose sun-loving plants.
