

Growth at SMPP

Thanks to a grant from Woodard & Curran, the Stone Mountain Propagation Project (SMPP) grew with the addition of a contract nursery manager. Kelley Hanada has increased propagation efforts, providing key conservation species to partners for several restoration projects and educational gardens. Production relies on weekly volunteers - in 2023, more than 50 volunteers contributed 825 hours at SMPP.
